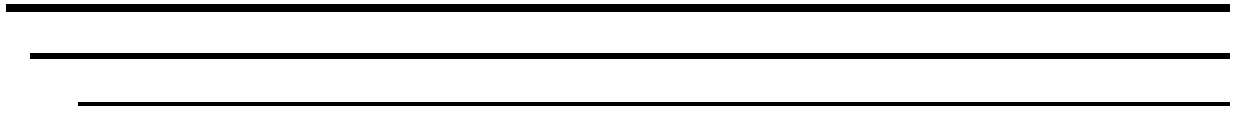
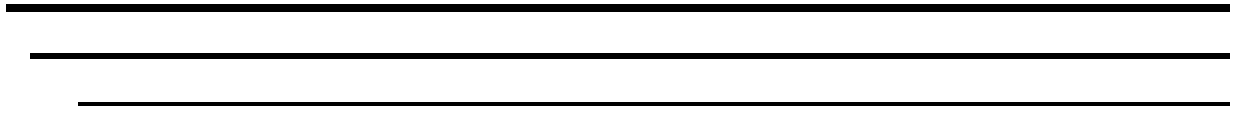


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Beach's Vision

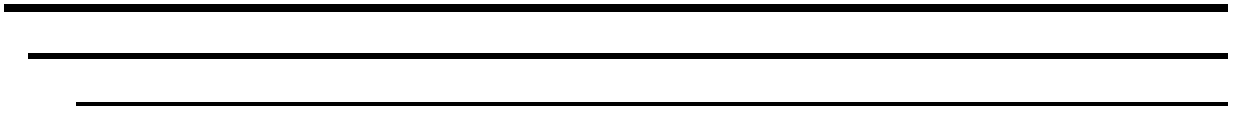
The city's Website is used as a community link for those living in Beach, Golden Valley County and Wibaux County. The web site links Beach to the world.

The community has quality cell phone service. No more stepping outdoors to make that cell phone call!

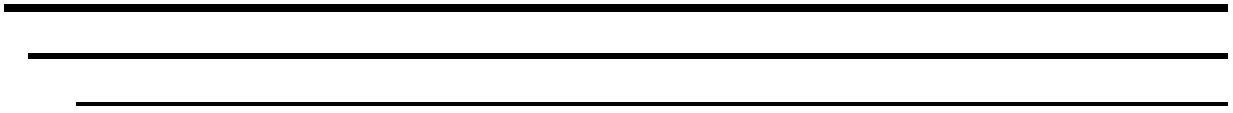

Creating a Plan

In the fall of 2007, the Beach City Council contracted with Roosevelt-Custer Regional Council to conduct a community strategic plan. The city accessed an Otto Bremer Foundation grant that R-CRC had for planning and a grant from the Northwest Area Foundation Horizons Program.

Why We're Doing It

The primary goal of the strategic plan is to give the community focus and unity and generate community discussions to direct the resources of the city of Beach. The City Council started the planning process to spark new ideas and empower residents to take action and implement projects they would like done in their community.

How We're Doing It

R-CRC facilitated the process by establishing a steering committee. Members of the public were invited to become involved in the planning process. Those who responded to the invitation and articles in the newspaper were on the steering committee. Individuals who took leadership roles to develop specific projects were also added to the committee.

Who We Are

Beach, the county seat of Golden Valley County, is a community of 1,116 people in a county of 1,924 people, according to the 2000 Census. Census data estimates that Golden Valley County has lost 417 people between 2000 and 2006. Population projections indicate that the decline in population is likely to continue.

The population continues to age. The median age in 2000 in Beach was 43.2 years of age and 41.2 in Golden Valley County. The median age is higher than Region VIII and the state of North Dakota. Approximately one in five persons in Golden Valley County were age 65 and older in 2000. This proportion is projected to reach nearly one in three by 2020, according to Northwest Area Foundation Horizons Program Community Profile, June 2004.

The city of Beach has 570 housing units according to the 2000 Census and half of them were built before 1948. Most of the newest housing stock in Beach is 37 years old. The median value of a single-family, owner-occupied home is \$40,100.

According to the Northwest Area Foundation Indicators Web site, in the real median value, which means the data has been adjusted for inflation, of owner-occupied housing Golden Valley County was \$47,530 in 2000 compared to \$87,099 in North Dakota. The real median value has decreased by 37.5 percent from 1980 to 2000.

Self-Assessments

Beach City Council Self-Assessment

The Beach City Council is a council form of government with Home Rule. The city has a mayor and six council members. Mayor is Walter Losinski and city council members are Jeanne Larson, Mark Benes, Perry Stockwell, Wade Walworth, Tim Marman, and Josh Wirtzfeld. The city has three full-time employees and one part-time employee year-round and hires three or four additional employees in the summer.

City council members ranked the following projects for issues and projects for 2008-2010:

1. Infrastructure – Sewer lines
2. Infrastructure – Streets
3. Housing
4. Commercial zoning
5. Inert landfill
6. Community Center
7. Infrastructure – Sidewalks, curb and gutter plan
 - Beach fire hall expansion
 - Infrastructure – Maintain waterlines
 - Mini Mall Renovation

Beach Fire Department Self-Assessment

The Beach City Volunteer Fire Department has 23 volunteers on its roster ranging in age from 21 to 60 years. Aging of the volunteers is an issue the department is facing. Almost all of the firefighters live in the city of Beach. One lives in Golva and is a member of

both the Beach and Golva fire departments. While they live in Beach, many have jobs that take them out of town during the day. If an individual owns his or her own business, it is hard to close it for a fire call and lose all revenue. This at times means a small turn out for a fire call. If 14 to 15 volunteers respond it is an adequate number and this is consistent. Usually the department has the best response at night.

The rural fire protection district levies taxes at the maximum allowed without a vote. Currently the tax dollars are about \$10,000 and that covers basic expenses, liability insurance and fuel. However, with escalating fuel costs funds generated may not cover expenses. The city allocates more \$15,000. The city owns the building and pays utilities.

The Beach Fire Department has a strong training program and requires all volunteers to pass an in-house test. The squad keeps safety as number one. It is a state-certified rescue squad.

Projects that the department is working on over the next three to five years are:

- New fire hall
- Compressed air foam unit to fight oil industry fires. Will seek grants from oil impact and oil companies
- Replace turnout gear – immediate 2 coats
- Long-term – replace trucks
- Communication devises – either analog or digital radios
- Ongoing training
- Ongoing upgrading of everything – hoses, air packs, pagers (unable to get parts any more)
- Ongoing recruitment – not to point of panic, but may need to change minimum age to 18
- Identify way to have more consistent funding

Beach Ambulance Self-Assessment

Community Ambulance Service, Inc., Beach, N.D., started in 1975. It is a 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization, that provides emergency medical transportation service. It is operated by a nine-member board that meets monthly. Board members include: President Roy Klym, Vice President Karen Wojahn, Secretary Elaine Baker, Treasurer Paul Lautenschlager, Squad Leader Kitty Knapkewicz, Dick Goodijohn of Golva, Wanda Olson of Sentinel Butte, Allan Muckle and Lee Weinreis.

The squad is staffed with 34 volunteers ranging in age from 19-20 to mid-50s. The squad has one EMT Paramedic, two EMT Intermediate, six EMT Basic, with an additional five in training for EMT Basic, and 20 squad members are first responders.

Projects for the next three years include: ongoing training, purchase new defibrillators, purchase new stair chair, hire second paramedic, and replacement of Golva ambulance.

Survey

As part of the strategic planning process, a community survey was conducted to identify the city's top priorities for the next five years. Deb Kantrud of R-CRC is facilitating the strategic planning process for the city. The survey results were released at the community workshop on March 10 where more than 60 people were registered to attend.

Beach-area residents ranked the people, safety, the medical clinic, businesses, school and Beach's location as the top assets in the survey conducted by Roosevelt-Custer Regional Council (R-CRC) of Dickinson.

Surveys were sent to every household, business and organization with a Beach, Golva and Sentinel Butte ZIP code. A total of 84 surveys were returned with an 11 percent return rate from the Beach ZIP code and 5 percent return rate from Golva and 3 percent return rate from Sentinel Butte.

The Beach Student Council assisted in the creation and delivery of a survey to students in grades seven through 12 at Beach Public School.

The community survey included an area that allowed respondents to rate how satisfied they were with a variety of community services and to write in what they felt are Beach's top assets, opportunities and issues.

Respondents were most satisfied with the pharmacy, Golden Valley Public Library, ambulance service, and fire protection.

They were least satisfied with availability of quality jobs, cell phone service, availability of jobs for youth, and apartment availability and cost. They identified the top issues in the community as: out migration, lack of jobs and lack of housing.

Survey respondents view the community's top opportunities as the school, youth, businesses operating in the community, jobs and entrepreneurship, hunting, Beach's geographical location, and tourism.

In response to the question regarding what businesses or services they would like added in the community, they responded: another grocery store with organic foods and local meats, a recreation facility, restaurants, a car and truck wash and recreation classes.

Fifty-five percent of the respondents said a spirit of mutual assistance and cooperation exists in Beach. And 83 percent of the respondents indicated they attend community events in Beach and 50 percent attend public meetings.

Almost 30 percent of the respondents said they would be willing to serve on community boards with 21 individuals indicated specific boards.

In response to the question about using a recreation facility, 76 percent of the respondents said they would use one if such a facility was available.

Eighty-seven percent of the respondents said they would recycle more if the city offered more recycling options.

Seventy-four percent said they would use a paved path for recreation.

Seventy percent said they would buy locally grown organic produce from a community supported agricultural association. And 66 percent said they would buy from a community winter greenhouse.

Projects Steering Committee Selected from Survey Results

After reviewing the results of the self-assessments and the community survey, the Beach-Area Strategic Plan Steering Committee identified the following potential projects for people to start working on at the community workshop Monday, March 10 at La Playa's Mexican Restaurant:

- Increase Tourism - Theme park, motel
- Provide more home health care to allow people to stay in own homes longer
- Develop zoning and platting for new housing and commercial development
- Form a Beach Community Foundation
- Housing – new, assisted living, apartments, renovate older homes, get more of older homes on the market
- Centennial Committee
- Bring in a small industry to Beach or Golden Valley County
- Attract electricians, plumbers, etc. to live and work in Beach. Develop strategies to draw them here: tax incentives, assist with college loans, subsidized loans on downtown commercial building
- Create a community recreational facility
- Develop more recycling options
- Develop a paved path for recreation (walking, biking, skating, skateboarding)
- Develop a Community Supported Agriculture Association to sell locally grown organic produce

Employees

The city has three full-time employees and one part-time employee year-round and hires three or four additional employees in the summer.

Service area

Beach is located one mile from the Montana state line along Interstate 94. The city of Beach serves people living along the North Dakota and Montana border. People travel to Beach for its businesses and services, which include a pharmacy, clinic, elevator, grocery store and equipment dealerships. The service area is estimated to be south to Baker and Ekalaka, Mont.; west to Wibaux, Mont.; north to Trotters and Sydney, Mont.; and east to Sentinel Butte and Medora. Beach is located about 60 miles west of Dickinson, the regional center in southwest North Dakota. People travel to Dickinson to shop and for medical services.

Beach has two motels, seven agri-businesses, five financial institutions, four daycare providers, five churches, four professional offices, nine construction businesses, three

gas stations, six insurance and investment businesses, five medical businesses, eight restaurants, bars and lounges, one grocery store, 13 retail businesses, and about 20 service businesses.

Area and Statistics

The city of Beach covers an area of about one-square mile. While the city has some areas zoned residential available for development, the city has limited lots zoned for commercial or industrial development.

Beach, the county seat of Golden Valley County, is a community of 1,116 people in a county of 1,924 people (2000 Census). Census data estimates that Golden Valley County has lost 417 people between 2000 and 2006. Population projections indicate that the decline in population is likely to continue.

The population continues to age. The median age in 2000 in Beach was 43.2 years of age and 41.2 in Golden Valley County. The median age is higher than Region VIII and the state of North Dakota. Approximately one in five persons in Golden Valley County were age 65 and older in 2000. This proportion is projected to reach nearly one in three by 2020, according to Northwest Area Foundation Horizons Program Community Profile, June 2004.

The city of Beach has 570 housing units (2000 Census) and half of them were built before 1948. Most of the newest housing stock in Beach is 37 years old. The median value of a single-family, owner-occupied home is \$40,100.

According to the Northwest Area Foundation Indicators web site, the real median value, which means the data has been adjusted for inflation, of owner-occupied housing Golden Valley County was \$47,530 in 2000 compared to \$87,099 in North Dakota. The real median value has decreased by 37.5 percent from 1980 to 2000.

Police Protection

Since 1992 the city of Beach has contracted with the Golden Valley County Sheriff Department for 30 hours per week of police protection. The amount of coverage is adequate.

The county will be short two deputies temporarily; one is attending police academy for 11 weeks, the second is being deployed to Iraq. The county is advertizing to fill the one temporary position and has been approved to add one new deputy position. The county at full force has a sheriff and four deputies.

The lack of housing either to rent or buy is a detriment when recruiting new, young officers to the force.

5-year needs: Adequate

Water System

The city of Beach is served by Southwest Water Authority. The city maintains three backup wells.

5-year needs: Adequate

Sewer System and Lagoon

The city's lagoon is in good condition and has capacity for community growth.

The sewer lines are made of clay and tree roots are causing blockage and breakage. City crews work each year to remove tree roots.

5-year needs: Replacement of clay sewer lines

Garbage

The city collects residential and commercial garbage. The garbage is trucked to a landfill in Baker, Mont.

The city recycles cardboard.

The city has an inert landfill. However, it needs more room. The city will have to purchase land for a new inert landfill.

5-year needs: New inert landfill

Snow Removal

The city has up-to-date snow removal equipment. The city uses a small skid steer loader to remove snow from driveways. However, snow removal is not a big issue in Beach. The region receives little snow most years.

5-year needs: Adequate

Streets, Curbs, and Gutters

The city has a schedule for the maintenance, upkeep and improvements to the city streets. The city has been adding accessible curbs as areas are scheduled to be repaired. Sidewalks and curbs are the responsibility of the landowner

5-year needs: Maintenance of streets

City Hall and Fire Hall

The city of Beach owns the building that houses the city offices and fire hall. The building was built in 1981 and is in good condition. However, the fire department needs more room. Building a larger fire hall in a new location is being discussed. If the fire hall is moved to a new location, the facility would be a community center. The city needs a handicapped accessible space without stairs for small conventions, meetings and dances. Community members use the hall facilities in Sentinel Butte and Medora for events.

5-year needs: Increased size of fire hall

Beach Mini Mall

In 2003 the city of Beach received a donation of the Beach Mini Mall. The building is good economic development for the city housing three to four businesses on the main floor. Rent covers maintenance costs. The building needs upgrades; insulation in the ceiling, new doors, bathroom improvements, painting and carpet replacement, and repair of water leaks in the basement.

The basement of the building is empty. It seems to be cost prohibitive to add an elevator to the building to make the basement accessible. The city wants to address the leak(s) in the basement and possibly the space could be used for storage.

Housing

The city lacks adequate housing. Individuals considering employment opportunities in Beach cite lack of housing to rent or buy and the condition of available housing that is on the market as deterrents to moving to Beach.

Prairie West Development Corporation is investing in a housing survey that will be conducted in 2008 to identify specific housing needs and opportunities.

The city of Beach is considering forming a housing authority that would allow the authority to use bonding to lower construction costs for a rental property in Beach.

5-year needs: Inadequate

Health Care

The city of Beach has a clinic and pharmacy that address the day-to-day medical needs.

The Beach Volunteer Ambulance has two ambulances in Beach and one in Golva. The squad has a paramedic who lives in Beach.

5-year needs: Adequate

Tourism

State tourism needs to share in costs of gateway information center.

APPENDIX 5

Beach Fire Department Self-Assessment

Volunteers

The Beach City Volunteer Fire Department has 23 volunteers on its roster ranging in age from 21 to 60 years. Aging of the volunteers is an issue the department is facing. The current bylaws require a volunteer be 21 years of age. It may need to be lowered to 18 years of age to get younger bodies on the fire line.

Almost all of the firefighters live in the city of Beach. One lives in Golva and is a member of both the Beach and Golva fire departments. While they live in Beach, many have jobs that take them out of town during the day. This at times means a small turn out for a fire call. If 14 to 15 volunteers respond it is an adequate number. Usually the department has the best response at night.

While the department has adequate volunteers now, the lack of people makes recruitment difficult. Some tools to recruit and retain volunteers include tax breaks, state funded retirement for volunteers, and support for employers and self-employed. The department has a fund where money was invested and interest is paid out to retirees.

Funding

The rural fire protection district levies taxes at the maximum allowed without a vote. Currently the annual tax revenue is about \$10,000 and that covers basic expenses, liability insurance and fuel. However, with escalating fuel costs funds generated may not cover expenses. The city allocates another \$15,000. The city owns the building and pays utilities.

The limited funding does not allow any money to be set aside for an equipment replacement fund. The last two trucks were purchased with grants from FEMA, ND oil impact funds, and community fundraisers.

Currently Beach has an insurance rating of Class 6 because of its water supply and training tower. In comparison Golva has a rating of Class 9 because of lack of water. Maintaining Beach's insurance rating of Class 6 is important as it keeps property owners taxes lower. If the city loses firefighters, house insurance premiums would go up.

Training

The Beach Fire Department has a strong training program and requires all volunteers to pass an in-house test. The squad keeps safety as its number one priority.

The department meets each month and also holds a monthly training session. It is hard to mandate too much time for training as people are not compensated for training time, it takes time away from family and people are working more. Preferably, all firefighters

should be trained as first responders, but time constraints limit the number trained. First responders require 50 hours of training.

All volunteers are required to qualify as Firefighter 1 within the first year to remain a member. They also are trained in Firefighter 2.

National training has changed from Firefighter 1 and 2 to Essential Program to be nationally certified. Beach does in-house training for basic training to ensure that all have Firefighter 1 and 2 status. The goal is to keep basic training intact and to teach all volunteers Beach's standard operating procedures. Sentinel Butte and Golva volunteers also go through Beach's training.

Rescue

Beach is also a state-certified rescue squad and has a member who is a certified instructor. Beach makes available its training to other department in the region.

It is valuable to have someone able to initially size up a situation prior to trying to extricate someone.

Dispatch

Dispatch is through state radio. The squad would prefer to have a local dispatcher who is familiar with this area and local operating procedures.

Number of Fire Calls

2006 – 80; 2007 – 41. Most calls are for prairie fires or motor vehicle situations – accidents and fires. Structure fires constitute the least number of calls. More than 90 percent of the calls are rural. In the past year other calls were for rescue, hazardous materials, good intention, tornados, false alarms, requests for sheriff assistance, locating lost children, runaways from Home on the Range. If manpower is needed in the area, the fire department is called.

Equipment

The department's equipment is in fairly good condition. The department has a new city pumper and a new rural grass unit.

A future need with the increased oil activity in the county is a compressed air foam system. The department has foam for structure and grass fires, but not for a tank or oil well fire. The unit is a two-axel car trailer with self contained system that costs \$60,000. The department does not have an adequate facility to house the unit at this time.

Facility

The department has vehicles located in two facilities in Beach; one is on the north side and one is adjoining city hall. The best case scenario for the department would be to move into one facility that would house 12 units with six doors. It would be more efficient. Initially two fire halls were built in response to the train tracks that intersect the town. The train is not as much of an issue now as there are four train crossing within two miles.

There is a city equipment reserve fund. The \$15,000 budget never leaves anything left over to go into the reserve fund.

Needs: Replace turnout gear over next 5 years. \$1,400 minimum.
 Replace 12 air packs. \$45,000

Communication

The department has conducted fund raiding events to raise enough money to buy new radios. Money is available for analog technology; however, more is needed for digital radios. A grant is being sought to assist in upgrading to digital radios.

Maps

Maps are in trucks. Ninety-five percent of the firefighters know how to get to most places in the district. Seldom is a person by himself. Maps are used more when responding to mutual aid calls.

Water Source

The city has a Southwest Water tank with 670,000 plus gallons of water capacity. This helps during the summer and prime firefighting months. The tank is emptied in the winter. In the event of an emergency the city foreman can call and ask SW Water to turn up the pressure. The city also has water wells that can be turned on. Businesses also have trucks with water tanks in town. The county has a tanker truck and mutual aid is used to call in tankers from Golva and Sentinel Butte.

Projects

- New fire hall
- Compressed air foam unit to fight oil industry fires. Would seek grants from oil impact and oil companies
- Replace turnout gear – immediate 2 coats
- Long-term – replace trucks
- Communication devises – either analog or digital radios
- Ongoing training

- Ongoing upgrading of everything – hoses, air packs, pagers (unable to get parts any more)
- Ongoing recruitment – not to point of panic, but may need to change minimum age to 18

APPENDIX 6

Community Ambulance Service, Inc., Beach, N.D.

Self-Assessment, May 5, 2008

Community Ambulance Service, Inc., Beach, N.D., started in 1975. It is a nonprofit organization, with a 501(c)(3) tax exempt status, that provides emergency medical transportation service.

Service Area

The Community Ambulance Service provides advanced and basic life support to all of Golden Valley County, Billings County west of the Little Missouri River, and southwest McKenzie County. It also has mutual aid agreements with Wibaux County, Mont., and Billings County. The service area is a large area with mostly of rural roads. The “golden hour” is often used to get to the scene of an accident and back to Beach and then there is another hour to transport to a hospital.

The Service transfers all trauma calls to the Dickinson hospital with an intercept with the Dickinson Ambulance Service. Other calls may be transferred to a patient’s preference. The paramedic makes the call. Transfers have been to Glendive, Baker and Sydney, Mont., and Williston and Hettinger.

Board

The ambulance service is operated by a nine-member board that meets monthly. All members of the Community Ambulance Service meet for the annual meeting. Board members are elected by squad members.

Board members include: President Roy Klym, Vice President Karen Wojahn, Secretary Elaine Baker, Treasurer Paul Lautenschlager, Squad Leader Kitty Knapkewicz, Dick Goodijohn of Golva, Wanda Olson of Sentinel Butte, Allan Muckle and Lee Weinreis.

Volunteers

The squad is adequately staffed with 34 volunteers ranging in age from 19-20 to mid-50s. The bylaws require volunteers be at least 18 years of age. Eleven of the volunteers live in Golva; two in Sentinel Butte, and the remainder in Beach.

The squad has one EMT Paramedic, two EMT Intermediate, six EMT Basic, with an additional five in training for EMT Basic, and 20 squad members are first responders.

The squad has one full-time paramedic who is on-call 24 hours a day for 25 days and off five days. EMTs provide coverage when the paramedic is off and when she is on an ambulance run. The Service would like to hire a second paramedic.

The ambulance, fire department and sheriff’s department have a good relationship.

Training

Training is held monthly with about 75 percent of the 34 volunteers attending. The paramedic is the training officer. A number of the volunteers are nationally registered, a requirement to respond to calls across state lines into Montana.

Initial EMT training is 360 hours. National requirements may double the required number of hours. Continuing education hours are required each year. Volunteers obtain this training at monthly training meetings and by attending weekend EMS conferences across the state.

In addition the ambulance service and fire department work closely to provide one or two training scenarios each year, such as preparing for an elevator emergency, airplane extraction at the airport, or oil well call.

The amount of time for training, on-call and responding to calls takes great commitment from the volunteers. The amount of time required is a challenge in recruiting new volunteers, whether for people who own their own business or employers who don't feel they can allow employees the adequate amount of time to respond to work-time calls.

Retention is good. Sometimes the squad will lose volunteers after responding to a particularly bad call or a call where a close relation or friend was in a bad accident.

Incentives may help in retention of volunteers. Allowing tax credits for employers who allow employees to serve on volunteer squads could also be a tool.

Number of Calls

The Service responds to an average of 15 calls per month.

Types of Calls

The types of calls fall into three major categories:

1. Transfers from Golden Valley Manor to hospital for falls, strokes, broken hips, etc.
2. Motor vehicle accidents from Interstate 94, N.D. Hwy 16 and rural roads.
3. Medical emergencies in the community: diabetes, overdoses, cardiac, high blood pressure, respiratory, accidents.

Equipment

The Service has three adequately equipped ambulances. Two are located in Beach and one in Golva. The two newest ambulances are two and four years old. The oldest ambulance is in Golva and is slated to be replaced.

The Service needs new defibrillators and a stair chair.

Facility

The ambulance garage and training room is adequate.

Funding

The Service is funded with 5 mills from the county, the maximum allowed for an ambulance service. The money generated by the 5 mills pays for the salary of the full-time paramedic.

Additional revenue is generated by fees for services provided, donations and grants. The funding is adequate.
